Careers Update

CV Writing Workshop with the Job Centre

On Wed 8th June, we welcomed the Job Centre into school to work with our KS4 students. They led an interactive session about writing CVs. They learnt how to construct a CV in the correct order. They were taught about the different sections of a CV and what should ideally go in each one. Students were asked to think about their predicted grades, as these could be used whilst they are waiting for their real results. They were asked how their hobbies could be embellished to provide a conversation point in an interview. They were also asked to provide any skills they have and any have achieved in and outside awards thev school. Most importantly they were told what not to include. The feedback from the students was very positive, so hopefully, this will help them in preparing for their next steps.

Hertfordshire Sports Village Careers Talk

On Tue 17th May, Jack Woods from Hertfordshire Sports Village came into school to talk to our Sports Studies students about his role as a Manager at Hertfordshire Sports Village. He talked a lot about his role at the Sports Village but also to the students about the expectations he would have of future employees, or students on work experience. He described the activities and events employees engage in and described the benefits of working there. He also answered questions from the students about roles in the sporting industry.

HSBC Gaming Workshops

Pupils all enjoyed having the opportunity to participate in sessions run by HSBC, aimed at using gaming as a way of getting them to think about how and why they are spending their money. They were then encouraged to explore whether there was a need to buy certain items and if they were value for money. The pupils also used the gaming concept to discuss online safety in terms of not sharing their personal information with people they do not know and how to ensure the safety of their friends when gaming. The pupils actively participated in the discussions and left the workshop thinking about their own spending habits and how they could be changed!
